Cambridge Maths workshop



"Palaverzelt"

We are students from the University and we will introduce and implement a special method for children within our project study "Mediation and Conflict Management", the "Palaverzelt". This conflict resolution ritual that children supported in difficult disputes and conflicts was developed by Prof. Dr. Ansgar Marx and a team of Kindergarten leaders, teachers and students of the Ostfalia University, between 2007 and 2009, in which it was successfully implemented at several primary schools and kindergartens in Braunschweig and Wolfenbüttel. Prof. Dr. Ansgar Marx was inspired by an African tradition, the Palavermethode. This form of conflict management is used in many places of Africa, which had led to a jointly developed consensus.

We are looking forward to our time at the International School. If you have any questions for us or about the project, we are at your disposal.

IB Diploma Geography Internal Assessment presentation



The students of Year 11 proudly presented their Geography Internal Assessment to students from year 9–11 during the last Secondary Assembly on 12th October.

Their topic on "International Migrants in Braunschweig" was a very interesting and a challenging one. Geography coursework is based on an investigation of some kind, and must therefore have an aim and either a hypothesis (or hypotheses) or a research

question. The time it takes will depend partly on how familiar the student (researcher) is with any relevant background material, the student's skill set, and on the complexity of the idea. Students were very well prepared under the able guidance of their teacher Dr. Sengupta. The questionnaire was well designed according to the expected standards and the survey was planned in advance with pre–acquired data from the relevant departments and agencies. The best part of the whole presentation was the question and answer session from students of year 9–11 which was answered very professionally and to the point from the group. This was quite motivating for the students who had an insight into what is expected when it comes to quality Internal Assessments.
